Summary

- Survey feedback has necessitated changes to proposed models
- Staffing challenges exist, particularly at the secondary level
- Equity and feasibility concerns for implementing both hybrid and distance-only models at high school level
- Longer in-person days at elementary based on student and family needs



Key Changes

Elementary level:

- 9/16 Phased-in split hybrid
- 11/1 Hybrid model with full in-person school day (distance days still part of schedule)

Middle level:

- 9/16 until end of 1st marking period Full distance learning
- November transition to split hybrid

High School:

- 9/16 start date full distance learning
- Opportunities for in-person community building, connection and extracurriculars

Survey Overview

Student and family survey

- Emailed to all families on 8/14
- Open through 8/18
- Targeted email and phone follow up

Staff Survey

- Emailed to all staff on 8/14
- Open through 8/18
- Department and building leaders follow up with staff that did not respond



Family Survey Responses

Family Responses as of 8/25:

Family Survey - Key Takeaways

- Selection of distance learning model more prevalent at elementary level (17% - 35% elementary vs. 15% at high school)
- Significant childcare needs: families of 1,300 students expressed interest in childcare 12:30-3pm and 1,000 students from 3-6pm
- Higher percentage of Asian (37%), Black (31%) and Hispanic/Latino (25%) students select distance-only vs. district average (23%).

Revised Elementary Recommendation

- 9/16
 - Hybrid opportunities to connect
 - DLA starts
- 9/21 Split hybrid K-2, 3-5 full distance
- 9/28 Split hybrid K-5
- 11/1 Full school day on in-person days (distance days still part of schedule)
- Outreach to Newton After School Associations to support after-care options on students' in person days.

Elementary Staffing

- Staff availability:
 - 10.9% unable to return to in-person learning due to personal or household member at risk
- Remote only staff will primarily support the distance-only model
- Small number of elementary teachers will need to change schools due to variations in model selection
- NPS to hire additional instructional support teachers and staff (general ed aides and additional special educators, as needed)

Sample Day:

- Morning Meeting (25 min)
- Literacy Block 1 (60 min)
- Math (60 min)
- Snack/Mask Break (15 min)
- Literacy Block 2 (60 min)
- Social Studies or Science (45 min)
- Dismissal, Lunch, Recess (90 min)
- Remote Special, Small Group or Project Based Learning (45 min)
- Closing Meeting (15 min)

Key Features:

- Independent work assigned by classroom teacher as appropriate. Intervention, project-based learning
- Grab and Go (or tent-based) lunch
- Times and schedules to be aligned by school



Elementary - Distance-Only Learning Model

- Students participating from all 15 existing district elementary schools
- Teachers, staff, and teams comprised of teachers and staff from across the 15 schools
- Multiple sections of each grade level likely
- Classrooms comprised of students from across the district; purposeful clustering of students from schools whenever possible
- Distance-Only Principal/Director oversight



Updated Middle School Recommendation

- Begin school year 9/16
 with distance learning
 model; in-person for high
 needs students
- Transition to hybrid schedule at start of 2nd marking term (11/16/20)
- Ongoing recruiting to address staffing shortages
- Explore in-person and distance extracurricular opportunities

Middle School Staffing

- At least 36 core teachers (52 total, 17.5%) unable to return to in-person learning due to personal/family health issues.
- For hybrid implementation, these teachers will teach remotely, with added staff to supervise and guide students for weekly in-person sessions.
- Hire a minimum of 36 instructional support staff.
- Technology feasibility needed to ensure all in-person students can participate simultaneously in video conferencing with remote teacher.
- Hire additional Special Education and ELL teachers to fully support in-person needs and high-needs cohorts.

Middle School Embedded Distance-Only Plan

All Students

• All middle school students stay assigned to their school, team and hybrid cohort (A/B). Begin the year in distance learning schedule.

- When split hybrid begins, all students attend all remote classes 3 times per week as scheduled with each class and advisory with school classmates.
- All students follow the same curriculum and lessons.

Distance-Only Students In Hybrid Model

- On their two in-person hybrid mornings, distance-only students attend alternative distance sessions in core classes, instead of in-person sessions.
- Distance-only sessions led by either teachers teaching remotely, or other grade-level teachers.

Updated High School Recommendation

- Full distance academic model for the foreseeable future
- In-person for high needs students
- Develop robust in-person community building and extra-curricular opportunities, including orientation, student support, and athletics where appropriate.
- Consider opportunities for in-person distance learning support during the year

High School Staffing

- At least 89 teachers (20.9%) unable to return to in-person learning due to personal/family health issues.
- Given the unique curriculum, specific licensures, and large numbers, unable to support remote teaching model for staff unable to return.
- Additional staffing also needed to fully support in-person needs for special education students and other high-needs students.



Hybrid with Distance-Only Model Challenge

Multiple planning team meetings K-12

- No acceptable model for an equitable distance-only learning model to parallel proposed hybrid model
- Specific high school challenges to running parallel distance-only and hybrid programs:
 - Career and Technical Ed. program
 - Specialized courses
 - AP courses
 - Diverse elective offerings
 - Small learning communities



High School Space Concerns

- 85% of students selected hybrid learning model
- With 6-foot distancing requirement, many classrooms have 12 student maximum.
- Large class sizes in many areas
 - SY19-20: Over 130 classes over 25 students in each high school
- Significant high needs population requiring larger spaces



Student Services

- Tiered academic and social emotional supports for all students in all buildings
 - Family Outreach/Survey/Student
 Interviews to assess
 - Provided in both person and distance

- Assessment Center
 - Summer (147 assessments conducted)
 - Fall space, in person evaluations



Student Services

- NECP: In-person regular schedule for all SWD, some community peers (likely about 30%)
- High Needs: DESE Criteria in-person as feasible
- Commitment to full implementation of IEP
 - in-person and distance
- Family collaboration & Service plans
- Student special education schedule notification aligned with building cohort/schedule timelines



1:1 Technology Update

Device Delays:

- Pre-K-2: 2300 iPads expected to ship Sept 21
- 3-8: 2800 Chromebooks expected "early September"
- 9th grade: 1000 Chromebooks DELAYED UNTIL JANUARY 2021 (informed of this on 8/23/2020)

Contingency Plans

- Use current supplies to provide iPads and Chromebooks to families that do not have alternative options
- Communicate with families this week
